

Highlights

Calgary small businesses account for 95 per cent of all businesses – they are a driving force within the city's business community. Small businesses provide jobs for local residents and are important for the vitality of inner cities. Small business owners have the advantage over larger corporations in that their size gives them the flexibility to adapt quickly in terms of aligning resources. They are able to be innovative with products and implement processes and efficiencies. These advantages, married with their general passion for their business and ability to


enjoy the advantage of customer focus, sets them apart from larger corporations.

Business Counts

Of Calgary's total number of businesses in 2019 (58,222), small business (businesses with less than 50 employees) accounted for 95.2 per cent or 55,434 busineses.

A breakdown of Calgary's small businesses by employee size illustrates that the smallest segment (1 to 4 employees) is the largest at 36,131 businesses or 65.2 per cent.

Small Business by Industry and Employee Size

The dominant industries that made up Calgary's small business sector in 2019 were:

- Professional, scientific, and technical services - 11,356 small businesses (20.5 per cent of total share)
- Construction 6,373 small businesses (11.5 per cent of total share)
- Health care and social assistance 4,958 small businesses (8.94 per cent of total share)

Small Business Growth

In 2019, 362 small businesses were created in Calgary, reflecting 0.7 per cent growth over the previous year. The total number of Calgary businesses (all employee sizes) grew by 327 year-over-year.

Industries representing the highest percentage in small business growth were:

- Public administration 57 small businesses in 2019 versus 43 in 2018, an increase of 14 businesses or 32.6 per cent
- Agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting 284 small businesses in 2019 versus 271 in 2018, an increase of 13 businesses or 4.8 per cent
- Health care and social assistance 4,958 small businesses in 2019 versus 4,761 in 2018, an increase of 197 businesses or 4.14 per cent

Industries representing the lowest percentage in small business growth were:

- Management of companies and enterprises -292 small businesses in 2019 versus 344 in 2018, a decrease of 52 businesses or -15.2 per cent
- Mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction - 876 small businesses in 2019 versus 964 in 2018, a decrease of 88 businesses or -9.1 per cent
- Finance and insurance 1,839 small businesses in 2019 versus 1,915 in 2018, a decrease of 76 businesses or -3.97 per cent

Small Business Per Capita

Relative to its population, Calgary had the second highest number of small businesses per capita of major cities in Canada in 2019 at a rate of 37.6 per 1,000 population.

Self-Employment

In 2019, there were 131,100 self-employed Calgarians, a decline in of -7.1 per cent from the 141,100 self-employed in 2018. On a per capita basis, Calgary had the second highest number of self-employment of major cities in Canada at 93.2 per 1,000 population.

During the past 10 years (2009-2019), Calgary experienced self-employment growth of 18.2 per cent.

In 2019, the largest group of Calgary entrepreneurs was the 45 to 54 age group with 33,600 self-employed or 25.6 per cent, followed by the 35 to 44 age group at 31,300 or 23.9 per cent of total self-employed.




Exceptional quality of life.



Small Business per Capita Across Canada





Business Licenses

Any time a business makes changes, moves, changes owners or ownership structure, the City of Calgary ends one business licence and issues a new one. In 2019, there were 32,372 business license renewals and 6,814 new business licenses issued. These results are in line with the 5-year average (2015-2019) of 31,680 business license renewals and 7,138 new business licenses issued.

Business Bankruptcies

Historically, Calgary has experienced a steady decline in business bankruptcies, from a high of 419 in 2005 to a low of 38 in 2015. Since 2015, business bankrupcties have fluctuated with 66 recorded in 2019.

Of Alberta's 155 business bankruptcies in 2019,

42.3 per cent were Calgary businesses.

With 95.2 per cent of Calgary businesses in the small business segment, it is assumed that the majority of business bankruptcies involve small businesses. Calgary business bankruptcy rates are low compared to the Canadian average and other major Canadan cities.
